PROJECTS

(DIS)CONNECTED INFRASTRUCTURES AND VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN (VAW)

Continuous and widespread Violence Against Women (VAW) in urban India highlights the challenge of delivering SDGs 5 and 11 – Gender Equality and Sustainable Cities and Communities. Combined with this is an acute information and skills gap in technology use amongst urban poor women that impedes their knowledgeable and empowered engagement with urban infrastructures. Our (DI)VAW project took a rights-based approach to the challenge: how to address VAW by improving women's knowledge of, and safe access to, urban infrastructure in the city of Thiruvananthapuram and Kochi. The British Academy funded project



'Disconnected infrastructures and Violence Against Women (VAW)' culminated with a final conference which took place on 27-28 June 2019 in King's College London. The conference had fifteen speakers across the globe who thoughtfully contribute to the title - 'Cities, Infrastructures and the 'Digital Turn' in the Post-colony.' Kalpana Viswanath, Safetipin's co-founder and CEO presented 'Using Data to Build Gender Friendly Cities' which had Safetipin's findings on the project and the overall role of Safetipin in highlighting the impact of disconnected infrastructures on the lives of women in rapidly urbanising cities. It showed that VAW has gained great visibility and it is now being recognised that violence and fear affect women's and girl's right and access to the city. In such context, Safetipin as a technology platform has generates data in different ways to map cities and to understand women's exclusion in them. Another researcher Laila, from Imperial College London presented the findings of our data around metro stations – foregrounding that the immediate zone of 500 metres radius around metro stations is actually safer than other parts of the city as it encourages mixed use and enhances activity. The final report on the project is due by the end of this year when an exhibition also will be held in the Khoj Studios, Delhi.

SAFETIPIN AUDITS IN SOUTH AFRICA

Safetipin to partner with CCI South Africa to build safety in communities. Along with the Womanity grant to introduce the Safetipin technology and methodology in E Thekweni municipality (Durban) in South Africa, we are also collaborating with CCI to work intensively in selected neighbourhoods in Johannesburg. Youth in the neighbourhoods will be conducting safety audits to help identify key safety concerns. The aim of the larger project is to improve Local Governance to address Gender Based Violence Response. It will be implemented in six sites in Gauteng, Mpumalanga and KwaZuluNatal. Masiphephe is a local governance Gender Based Violence (GBV) response project whose goal is to reduce vulnerability to GBV through improved local governance and service delivery through strengthening the capacity of local structures to lead, coordinate and manage a community response to GBV response to GBV prevention and mitigation.

ENHANCING MOBILITY FOR YOUNG WOMEN

In partnership with the FIA Foundation, Safetipin is working on a project in Mewat, Haryana in India to address the issue of the lack of safety and the fear that girls face in public spaces, which adversely affects their opportunities of education, employment and overall growth in life. Safetipin team kickstarted the project work in Mewat by conducting two focus group discussions with young girls who have dropped out from school and mothers of the young children in Rozka village.



The discussions helped us to understand the challenges that these young girls and women are facing in their everyday lives. Safetipin team has a series of activities lined up for this project in the upcoming months including interacting with girls and women in Bawana and Jamia Nagar. There will be FGDs conducted in both areas along with Key Informant Interviews (KIIs) to get a better understanding of all

WOMEN'S SAFETY AND MOBILITY MAPPING IN BIHAR WITH CENTRE FOR CATALYZING CHANGE

This year in early January, Safetipin was invited to present at a roundtable series on 'Women's Safety and Mobility: Impact on Economic Participation' in Patna organised by Centre for Catalyzing Change (C3). Experts from the field as well as senior representatives from Police, Transport and Women Development Corporation (WDC) of Bihar participated at the roundtable. WDC understood Safetipin's potential in mapping the physical reality of cities. Further in consultation with C3, a mapping project was proposed to address the issues of public safety in three cities of Bihar, Patna, Bihar Sharif, and Gaya, through participatory data collection using both the innovative Safetipin applications. Recent meetings with the WDC officials in Patna and the C3 team in Delhi has set the ball rolling. Safetipin is now gearing up for data collection through 'Safetipin Nite' and 'My Safetipin' in Patna first, followed by the other two cities in Bihar. Since the information on the applications specifically focuses on the experience of women and girls, involving and providing them with an interactive tool around feelings of safety can be empowering. The use of 'My Safetipin' App, and local capacity building, will provide large scale data at the street level and promote citizen engagement. The ongoing project will map all the main roads as well as some key public spaces in the city. Once data collection is complete, coding and analysis of the collected data will be conducted to work further with the Bihar Government in making public spaces safer and inclusive for women and girls. The data collected will be shared as GIS layers and representational maps with the Government for prioritising work on improving infrastructure which directly affects safety and security in the three cities. In addition this, the project will work towards strategic partnerships with city stakeholders to make these cities safe and inclusive.

FLONE INITIATIVE



Flone Initiative is a woman led organisation in Kenya to end violence against women and girls in public spaces. Their mission is to influence behavioural change and to promote tolerance and acceptance by strengthening capacities at grassroots level in communities. As a part of a project that we are doing with them, Safetipin was in Mombasa, Kenya from 21st-24th July to provide training to the volunteers for My Safetipin data collection in Mombasa Island. A safety audit walk was also organised where our team, Flone Initiative members and the volunteers walked around the city and performed safety audits via the app together.

MAPPING DELHI WITH SAFETIPIN

DWCD (Department of Women and Child Development), GNCTD engaged Safetipin to conduct safety audits within the jurisdiction of the three Municipal Corporations of Delhi in 2018-2019. Earlier in 2016, Safetipin submitted a safety analysis report of the audited main roads and 15 metro stations to various stakeholders of the Delhi government. Based on the lighting data of the report, improvement works such as fixing the existing streetlights and installing additional streetlights in the areas of poor lighting were carried out by PWD. Safetipin completed its second round of audits for the Delhi project in May 2019. This study in 2018-2019 focuses on all parameters of a safety audit to assess the on-ground conditions and suggest recommendations for enhancing safety in public spaces in Delhi.

As part of this project, a total of 25,294 audits have been conducted in the city from Dec, 2018- May, 2019. Of the total audits, 11,624 audits have been conducted in North DMC followed by 11,156 audits in South DMC and 2,514 in East DMC. Data has been collected using Safetipin Nite in night time along all the roads of Delhi's three Municipal Corporations except the colony roads. The conditions are examined based on the parameters of the safety audit with greater detail on the existing status of the infrastructure. Manual audits at specific location points were conducted using My Safetipin app. These points include metro stations, bus stops, public toilets, public parks, schools, universities, parking lots, cinema halls, tourist places and liquor stores within Delhi.

Safetipin has also collaborated with residential neighborhoods like Chittranjan Park, Jamia Nagar and university students in Delhi to collect safety related information. With the support from Delhi Commission of Women (DCW), representatives of mahila panchayats from various local communities were also trained to conduct safety audits using My Safetipin. Safetipin has also shared the project report with The Department of Women and Child Development for their feedback.

3rd May, 2019

As part of our Delhi Project, Safetipin conducted a training session for the representatives of mahila panchayats at Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) office. The training session focused on training the representatives to conduct safety audits using the My Safetipin app. This session was attended by representatives from areas like Laxmi Nagar, Badarpur, Jagatpuri, Kanjhawala, etc.



25th April, 2019

As a part of community outreach for the Delhi project that Safetipin was working on, the team worked with Cequin to get data in Jamia Nagar. Safetipin team went to the Cequin office in Jamia Nagar and conducted a safety audit training with a group of 20 individuals who lived in and around the area. The data collected was extensive and useful for the report analysis.



16th April, 2019

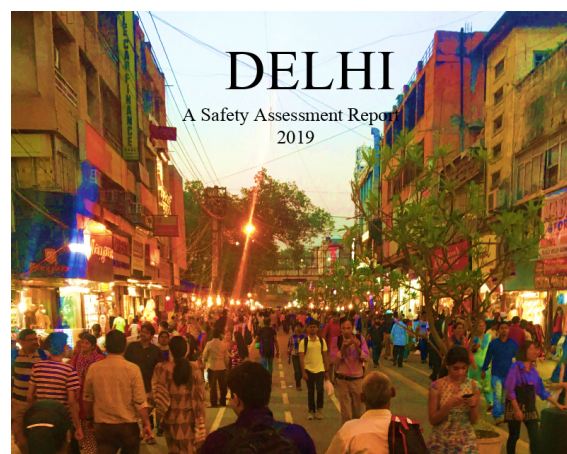
As a part of the Delhi project, Safetipin team conducted a training session for the students of Masters of Arts in Urban Studies at Ambedkar University, Karampura Campus, Delhi. We introduced Safetipin and shared insights of our projects with the students. The session included a detailed explanation on conducting safety audits using the My Safetipin app.



2nd June, 2019

As part of our Delhi project, we collaborated with communities in the city to collect neighbourhood level data using My Safetipin app. CR Park resident community has been actively involved in initiating a collective awareness to improve the quality of life in their neighbourhood. A community meeting was organized by the CR Park Green Community on June 2, 2019. The findings from the safety audits done using My Safetipin, surveys and discussions were presented in the meeting. These findings and ideas were presented in the form of plans and were discussed for inputs from the community.

A stakeholder consultation meeting chaired by Sh. Anil Baijal, Lieutenant Governor of Delhi, was held at Raj Niwas. Safetipin presented the findings of the Delhi project in the meeting. The consultation was attended by the representatives from the Home Department, Department of Women and Child Development, Municipal Corporations of Delhi, New Delhi Municipal Council, Public Works Department, Delhi Commission for Women, Delhi Police, Delhi Urban Shelter Improvement Board, Department of Training and Technical Education, Delhi School of Social Work and Ambedkar University. The final project report shall be shared with the Lieutenant Governor, Delhi.



SOCIAL VULNERABILITY AUDITS IN KOLKATA

The Kolkata Environmental Improvement Investment Program (KEIIP) has engaged Safetipin, a Social Vulnerability Audits expert to evaluate its public spaces in order to make them more inclusive and improve the city's overall liveability standard. The said project is funded by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to provide KEIIP with the required technical assistance to make Kolkata an inclusive city by conducting public space inclusiveness audits and piloting for improvement. Safetipin will conduct the data collection using 'Safetipin Nite' application only for visual mapping of Kolkata through geo-located photographs in partnership with KEIIP as the key government stakeholder and ADB as the project partner. Based on the analyzed data and generated maps and best practices in other cities, recommendations will be drawn up on how to improve inclusivity and liveability in the city. Safetipin will also be involved in strategizing a pilot design intervention in two selected wards with consultation with the key stakeholders. The main objectives of the project is to map the city in order to improve mobility, accessibility and safety for vulnerable groups. It will also map in order to improve city's resiliency, social inclusion, usage of, access to and safety in public spaces. To achieve the above, Safetipin will use available GIS maps of Kolkata (developed through KEIIP) and add geo located information or data sets on roads and public spaces to it. Last couple of months, June and July, after meeting the officials at Kolkata Municipal Corporation (KMC) and the ADB team from Manila in Kolkata, Safetipin has officially began the project. With the completion of the driver's training program, data collection through 'Safetipin Nite' will began and cover the entire city through motorable roads. Post data collection, coding and analysis will be done to primarily assess the issues around accessibility in the city especially for the vulnerable groups.

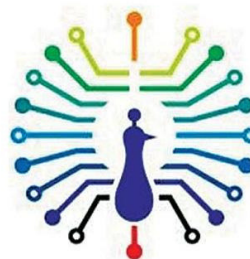


30th July- 2nd August

Safetipin team was in Kolkata providing training to the drivers for data collection via the Safetipin Nite app. We train the drivers and go along with them to ensure that the data collection is accurate. After it is done, the analysis from our program team will start.

ADDRESSING SAFETY IN PUNE

A Safety audit report for Pune ABD area i.e. Aundh-Baner-Balewadi was shared with Pune smart city cell as well as IISc, Bengaluru. The joint project with IISc, Bengaluru intends to bring various data sets together to improve and catalyse decision making process at city level. Safetipin will also be sharing the Safety audit report for Pune municipal area.

#SAFETYFORSHE

As a part of Safe Cities project with The Asia Foundation, Safetipin is working to prepare a safe cities index. Safetipin team conducted an in-depth research to identify and prepare a list of indicators which can evaluate safety. An expert consultation was organized on 15th April, 2019. A diverse group of urban planners, socialist, economist as well as policy makers were invited in the consultation. Experts discussed each indicator in detail to understand their correlation with safety. The consultation resulted in crisp and clear list of indicators along with their sub-indicators. Safetipin team is working on to list down data sources for each indicator.

In partnership with The Asia Foundation, India, Centre for Social Research (CSR) and support from KOICA (Korea International Cooperation Agency) Safetipin launched its safety analysis reports for Bhopal and Gwalior at the Bhopal state consultation held on July 24, 2019 in Bhopal. The issue of women safety in public transport was the major focus of this consultation and was discussed at length in the panel discussions at the event. Safetipin team presented the findings from Bhopal and Gwalior collected by safety audits, focus group discussions and surveys with women respondents.



A photography competition “Women in Public Spaces” was organized for this project in the month of June. Selected entries from the competition were also displayed at the consultation. Safetipin is excited for its upcoming consultation in August first week in Jodhpur.



MAPPING MOBILITY WITH BOGOTA CITY GOVERNMENT

As part of the initiative “I move Safe” by Bogotá Women’s District Secretariat supported by CAF (Latin American Development Bank), Safetipin has collected over 0.5 million photographs of Bogotá’s streets and bike paths. These images have been analysed and coded according to Safetipin parameters to identify areas for intervention. This project will result in a set of recommendations for integrating the gender perspective in the planning public spaces and public transport in the city.



WOMANITY AWARD: USING SAFETIPIN IN SOUTH AFRICA



Safetipin was awarded the Womanity Award last year along with Soul City Institute to conduct a safety audit study in South Africa. The project is being implemented in Durban in partnership with the E Thekweni municipality. The project will involve mapping the entire city as well strengthening the Safe Taxi Campaign by collecting data about safety on public transport and at taxi ranks in the city. Further Soul City Institute will also involve young women who are part of the Rise Clubs to map their experiences of safety and public spaces. This project will run through three years.

WORKSHOPS, CONFERENCES & EVENTS!

Vedica Scholars Women's Leadership Programme

Kalpana Viswanath 12th April, 2019

The Vedica Scholars Programme for Women is an 18-month, re-imagined professional certificate in management practice and leadership based in New Delhi. Safetipin presented and spoke about building gender inclusive cities. The issue of safety was also discussed with everyone giving in their inputs of struggling with safety in their respective cities.



Tunis Forum on Gender Equality

The Tunis Forum on Gender Equality was organised to hold an open debate to inform and inspire the preparations for Beijing +25 and the commemoration of the 20th Anniversary of UNSCR 1325. Safetipin was on the panel on Information and Technology. The panellists discussed how information technology and digital applications are helping women to access social services to which they are entitled and make a difference in the promotion and protection of women's rights.

Madam Mlambo-Ngcuka, Under-Secretary-General of the United Nations and Executive Director of UN Women, had a meeting with the participants on how to ensure meaningful involvement of young feminists in all stages and aspects of the 25-year review and appraisal of the Beijing Platform for Action and its accelerated implementation. Safetipin spoke on how reliable data is the base for effective policies and on how the government should collect data on women's experiences in the city and transport as part of the gender statistics.



4th Asia Pacific Forum on Urban Resilience, New Delhi

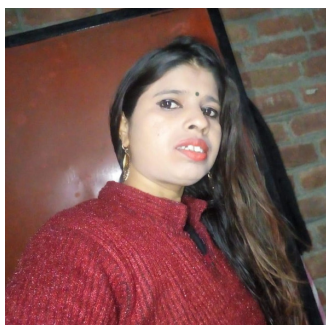
Stop Street Harassment
