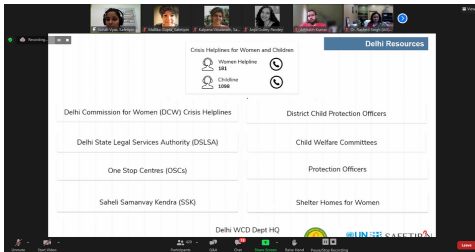

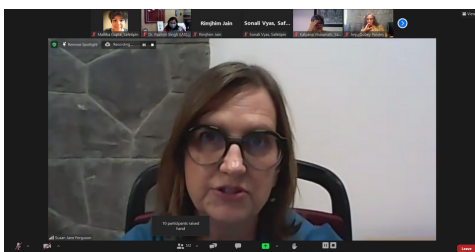
DELHI 'FIND SUPPORT' FEATURE LAUNCHED!



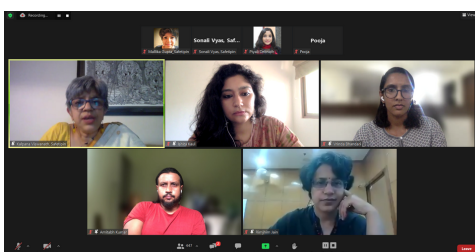
On 12 October 2021, Safetipin launched a directory of services on My Safetipin App for women and children seeking support or shelter from gender-based violence in Delhi NCR. This directory was developed in collaboration with the Department of Women And Children, Delhi Government and UN Women India.



The feature was launched by Dr. Rashmi Singh, IAS (Special Secretary cum Director, DWCD and Department of Social Welfare, Govt. of NCT of Delhi) and Susan Ferguson (UN Women Representative for India), in the presence of over 500 associates of the DWCD, who work at the grassroots level for women and children in Delhi.



The Launch was followed by a panel discussion on "Enabling girls and women's access to opportunities through technology and digital resources" which carried forward the theme for International Day of the Girl 2021- 'Digital Generation, Our Generation!' The panel was moderated by Kalpana Viswanath from Safetipin and the speakers included Vrinda Bhandari (Advocate, Supreme Court of India), Amitabh Kumar (Founder, Social Media Matters) and Ishita Kaul (Programme Analyst, UN Women). The panel brought up insights into tackling digital violence against women, bridging the digital gap, and using technology to reduce violence against women.

COMPETITION BRIEF

Gender is a social construct. Space like gender is socially constructed too. The spatial arrangement of buildings and open spaces in our cities, reflect and reinforce the nature of gender relations in our societies. These relations manifest in complex ways in how we interact with space or vice-versa. It is seen, access to space is fundamentally related to social status and power dynamics. Hence, such socio-spatial manifestations, restrict women's choices to fully participate in public life. It is even more difficult to negotiate space for people who fall out of the cis-male/female binary.

Further, global and local forces like climate change, urban migration or resettlement and, non-inclusive urban policies have deeper impact on the lives of women and others. This competition seeks to discover how innovative ideas under each of the given themes could transform existing public spaces into safe, accessible and inclusive urban environments.

She was part of the committee that prepared a report on Women's Safety in Delhi for the city government.

Safetipin Nite Data Collection completed In Dhaka, Bangladesh

Safetipin with The World Bank is piloting digital technologies for more inclusive urban public spaces in Dhaka, Bangladesh. The project seeks to address the issue of women's safety in Dhaka by enhanced participatory data collection using the Safetipin Applications - My Safetipin and Safetipin Nite. We are happy to announce that we have completed data collection through 'Safetipin Nite' for the whole of Dhaka, covering over 1500 kms of motorable roads. We have also started the image analysis process and soon would be out with our initial findings.

The city has completely opened up now with no movement restrictions, making public spaces in full use again. User-generated, public space audits using 'My Safetipin' have been initiated as well by women and girls in Dhaka. On completion of data collection, the project will conduct analysis of the complete data sets and draft recommendations on how to make public spaces safer and accessible for women and others.

Safetipin Site Data Collection in Buenos Aires, Argentina

As part of the safety and assessment mapping project in partnership with World Bank, detailed assessments were conducted at and around 7 railway stations of the Mitre line in Buenos Aires. Staff from the railway operators, ADIF (Administración de Infraestructuras Financieras Sociedad del Estado) and SOFSE (Operadora Ferroviaria Sociedad del Estado) collected in-depth information on spatial and infrastructural parameters using Safetipin's web app; Safetipin Site.

Additionally, user perception surveys were also conducted to capture users' experience of mobility around these railway stations. We are currently working on the data analysis to identify gaps in existing infrastructure and suggest recommendations for building safe, accessible and gender-inclusive railway stations.

Feedback session for safety audits with community members in Durban.

Soul City Institute and Safetipin organised a stakeholder workshop on Oct 1 2021, in Durban to disseminate the findings of Safety Audits conducted in two communities; KwaMashu and KwaNdengezi. The workshop was attended by the volunteers of Ethembeni Crisis Centre and Gugu Dlamini Foundation, representatives from National Taxi Association along with Ms Nomusa Shembe from Safer Cities Unit of eThekweni Municipality.

The workshop also included group work to identify the areas within the communities for priority intervention work. Going forward, the feedback and learnings from the workshop would be incorporated into the audit report. This report would then be submitted to the eThekweni Municipality.

Safetipin at Pune Smart City's celebration of 'Azadi ka Amrit Mahotsav'

On the occasion of 75 years of independence, Pune Smart City Development Corporation collaborated with Safetipin and Pune IUDX to promote MySafetipin App and seek #FreedomFromFear in Pune. The collaborators collectively promoted the use of the 'Quick Audit' feature, which provides a safety score in three easy steps, using Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning.

Pune Smart City will be featuring Pune residents with the highest number of audits, as 'Safeti-Champions' to encourage the use of the app and collectively make Pune safer.

Hard City - Soft City: A South Asian perspective on the dichotomy of physical and operational urban technologies.

Harvard Graduate School of Design Alumni Council organised a virtual summit on the South Asian perspective on the dichotomy of physical and operational urban technologies on 24th September 2021. Kalpana Viswanath was invited as one of the speakers of the Soft-City panel.

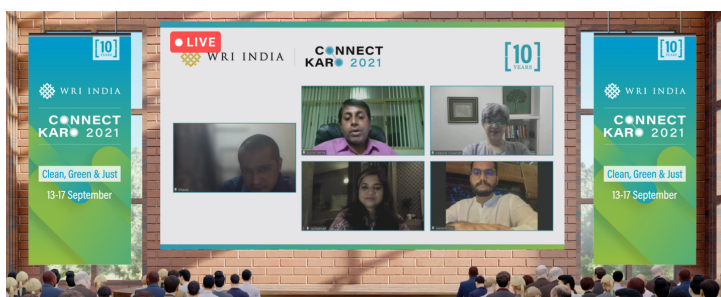
The discussion revolved around the inclusive and integrative ways to update existing infrastructure and technologies, beyond optimizing its performance for efficiency, to create more resilient, equitable, and sustainable neighbourhoods and improve their governing systems.

The Hard City panel unpacked the discourse of physical infrastructure beyond the top-down modernist visions of efficient engineering solutions. The Soft city panel highlighted the operational UrbanTech that animates the city with entrepreneurial and civic innovations. The two panels presented views that drew the dialectic relationship between physical and operational infrastructure that compose and configure the South Asian cities.



"Safer Streets, Safer Cities" panel discussion at WRI Connect Karo 2021

Connect Karo 2021 is organised by WRI India to engage with decision makers, thought leaders and experts in urban planning, water infrastructure, air quality, transport, electric mobility, child friendly cities, safer streets and more, to gain insights and share key learnings.



The event theme for the year was 'Clean, Green & Just', and it was held virtually starting September 13, 2021 over five days. On September 16, 2021, Kalpana Viswanath spoke at the "Safer Streets, Safer Cities" panel discussion on how cities can be made inclusive & Safer by Design, for women. The panel questioned who the real users of roads are, and brought up the need to have diversity in the process of planning. It also highlighted how 'pilot projects' are slowly becoming an escape from actual, long-term resolution of issues regarding safety and accessibility on Indian streets.

Building Safer Cities: Women's Safety through Technology and Global Travelling

On 27 September, Safetipin collaborated with two women-led apps; GreetHer and JustHerride Share to celebrate World Tourism Day with World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) on this year's theme: Tourism for Inclusive Growth.

Mallika Gupta from our team spoke with Kimberly Evans, Founder and CEO of JustHerride Share, and Vanessa Karel, Founder of GreetHer, on using technology and data to build sustainable environments that target safety risks for women around the world.



'Quantifying change in activity mobility patterns in the context of a 15-minute city'

Ankita Kapoor from our team participated in a workshop organized by C40 titled "Quantifying change in activity mobility patterns in the context of a 15-minute city" on Sep 29th. The interactive workshop aimed at discussing key indicators of a 15-minute city that affect the mobility patterns of the city users. The session also focused on discussing methods that could be used to quantify the change in physical activity of the users.



Sustainable Urbanisation Strategy (ASUS) Thematic Dialogue on 'Urban Safety and Security' @ the ASEAN Sustainable Urbanisation Forum.

From 6-8th October, ASEAN convened its first multi-stakeholder forum dedicated to promoting sustainable urbanisation in the region- The ASEAN Sustainable Urbanisation Forum (ASUF). ASUF served as a platform to promote connectivity, knowledge sharing, and learning opportunities for ASEAN Member States, cities, and people.



On 7 October, Kalpana Viswanath moderated a Thematic Dialogue on 'Urban Safety and Security' with experts from across ASEAN. The discussion focused on exploring digital technology as an enabler of building safer and liveable cities, through the lens of ethics and digital resilience.

'Girls Breaking the Digital Divide in South Asia'- International Day of the Girl 2021



On the occasion of 'International Day of the Girl,' UNICEF South Asia and Plan International Asia-Pacific organised the "Girls Breaking the Digital Divide in South Asia" webinar on the topic 'Digital Generation, Our Generation.'

Sharmila Ray from UNICEF India presented the Safety Mapping project conducted in Surat using Safetipin digital tools, to discuss the necessity of bridging the digital gap and link girls to better opportunities.

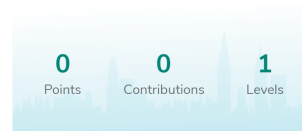


My Safetipin app

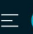
Under-Reporting, no Access to Recourse Behind 'Dip' in Crimes Against Women in 2020, Say Experts

Streetlights on the blink in south Delhi, survey identifies 2,557 dark spots
