

Safety audits using the My Safetipin app in Honduras

UNICEF has engaged Safetipin to identify key factors which make girls and women feel unsafe while using public spaces within the selected communities in Honduras. This project seeks to address the issue of women safety by enhanced participatory data collection using the My Safetipin application. As part of this project, an online training session was conducted by Safetipin to train the local data collection team to conduct safety audits using the My Safetipin app. Over 1300 safety audits were conducted within the communities in November. We are now analyzing the collected information and hope to share some interesting findings from the assessment next month.

'Cities for You(th)' - Project Update



The 'YAARA (Youth Advocacy for Accountability on Rights and Action) Advocates' Program under the 'Cities for You(th)' project has been running in Jaipur and Udaipur for over four months, starting from August 2022. A cohort of 16 young advocates are being trained to build leadership and communication skills to advocate for their rights in the city. In two months they collected over 15,00 data points in each city, using My Safetipin App. This data will guide the young leaders to advocate for safe and accessible public spaces with stakeholders in their own city. In December 2022, they also attended a two day workshop organised by Safetipin, The YP Foundation and Saarth to design social action projects for driving change within communities. Going forward the advocates plan to conduct stakeholder meetings, collect data and build campaigns to advocate for change within these communities.

Safetipin along with its partners The YP Foundation, Saarth, School of Planning and Architecture Delhi and Start Up! are implementing the 'Cities for You(th)' project supported by Fondation Botnar, in four cities in Rajasthan to understand and improve the wellbeing of urban youth with a focus on young women.


